NANCY MCALLISTER RECEIVES PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

On Wednesday, October 4th, former SMWRA President Nancy McAllister was awarded the Southern Maryland Conservationist of the Year award by the Southern Maryland Audubon Society. This award is given each year to the individual who has contributed the most to the preservation of our region's natural resources. Nancy was honored for her leadership as the first and founding President of the St. Mary's River Watershed Association, and for her continued hard work as a leader, educator, and community activist.

Congratulations, Nancy, we're very proud of you!

GRANTS UPDATE

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) grant to Sustainable Development Institute is underway as Roger Stone (Project Director) makes the final budget and contract negotiations. This grant provides \$35,000 for an oyster recovery assessment project at Chesapeake Bay Field Lab and in the St. Mary's River. An Abell Foundation grant of \$5000 to "seed" the project (no pun intended) was used to purchase tanks and floats with oysters. These will be deployed to measure oyster filtering ability and to assess the development of biodiversity in aquaculture oyster communities. Gary Williams is helping us recruit dock owners from Tippity-Witchity Island south to St. Inigoes Creek as "hosts" for the aquaculture floats.

Another grant to St. Mary's College of Maryland from the Chesapeake Bay Trust (CBT) will augment the \$5000 provided by the SMRWA to monitor water quality at 15 non-tidal, stream stations in the St. Mary's River Watershed. SMRWA funds will cover July and October stream sampling, and CBT monies will cover January — October 2007 sampling. With this grant we will purchase a Yellow Spring Instrument water quality device that measures temperature, dissolved oxygen, pH, and other water quality parameters. It will be available to watershed Association members who would like to use it. We also encourage and welcome watershed members to help us sample. January is the most pleasant month of the year to be out sampling, so we are sure many people will want to sign up!

















RIVERFEST 2006 — A HUGE SUCCESS AND A WHOLE LOTTA FUN!

This year's Second Annual RiverFest was quite a success, building on last year's momentum. Visitor participation increased over last year to more than four hundred, and we attracted a number of new sponsors. While enjoying the day's events, we managed to increase our membership roles by twenty new members, and received over \$800 in donations. Not bad for a day's work! The lovely fall weather combined with the beautiful setting at Captain Jack Russell's place on Island Creek, St. George Island, provided the perfect backdrop for the day's events.

A ride on the skipjack The Dee of St. Mary's with Captain Jack was the highlight of the day for the saltier visitors, while live music and a number of fun, educational activities and exhibits provided others with many ways to celebrate and appreciate the Southern Maryland tidewater. The Rain Barrel Workshop given by Christina and Frank Allen were a very big hit. Those who joined SMRWA at RiverFest were able to make a rain barrel to take home as a thank you for their membership, though fitting the rain barrels into the family car did provoke some head scratching at the end of the day. Kids enjoyed painting pumpkins, beach seining on St. George Creek with Ange Funyas, oyster tonging at the dock with St. Mary's College students, going on a bird walk with Tyler Bell, or making a balloon animal with Mr. Bumblebritches (Bryan Clapp). Paddlers Bill Gallagher, Carol Paris, and Lynn Erwin shared their love of kayaking with anyone who didn't mind getting a little wet. Captain Will Gates, Master of the *Maryland Dove*, had the ship's jolly boat on view from Historic St. Mary's City. The live music provided by Indian Summer, Michael and Carrie Kline, and Gary Rue added a pleasant mood to the festivities.


